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CEO REMARK

Lessons Learned, Deeper Commitment, Greater Responsibility

As we reflect on ARBA Foundation’s work in 2024, one lesson stands out clearly: poverty among children is rarely simple, and meaningful change requires depth, patience, and trust. Behind every statistic in this report are children whose lives are shaped by circumstances beyond their control—illness, learning barriers, family instability, or the invisible nature of urban poverty. Yet, time and again, we witnessed that when the right support meets the right moment, children can defy their starting point.

This year, our teams partnered closely with hospitals, healthcare providers, and schools. Key takeaway: Collaboration is essential—no single organisation can address child poverty alone, but partnerships enable early, effective intervention.

A key lesson in 2024: targeted, long-term support yields lasting change. Key takeaway: Sustained assistance in nutrition, education, therapy, and opportunity helps children realise their potential. Poverty is a lack of access, not a lack of talent.

Systems matter. Key takeaway: Many vulnerable children remain invisible without proper systems. Our partnerships bridge gaps so children aren’t forgotten by institutions.

As we move into 2025, our commitment is clear: we aim to do more and go deeper. Deeper into hospitals, where children’s health and

development determine lifelong outcomes. Deeper into schools where educators are fighting daily to keep hope alive in classrooms challenged by inequality. Deeper into communities where poverty is complex, layered, and often hidden.

Our focus: help children break the poverty trap for a better future. Key takeaway: This challenging work demands courage, collaboration, and consistency. It is both essential and deeply human.

On behalf of the ARBA Foundation team, I extend my sincere gratitude to our partners, supporters, and frontline collaborators who share this mission. The journey ahead is challenging, but the children we serve remind us why we must persist. I urge everyone reading this report to join us—by supporting, advocating, or collaborating—in striving for a Malaysia where no child’s future is determined by poverty.

UNDERSTANDING POVERTY IN LABUAN'S DIVERSE COMMUNITY

Labuan, a Federal Territory of Malaysia, is home to a rich and diverse population comprising Brunei Malays, Kedayan, Chinese, Kadazan-Dusun, Murut, Rungus, Indians, and other ethnic groups. This multicultural identity shapes the island's social fabric and community life. Despite Labuan's reputation as an affluent territory, pockets of poverty persist. Vulnerable groups such as fishermen, unskilled workers, the elderly, and persons with disabilities face significant socioeconomic challenges that often go unnoticed. In 2024, we engaged with communities across Labuan, visiting various localities to better understand their lived realities.

Through collaboration with local organisations working to alleviate poverty, we gained valuable insights and were able to contribute meaningfully to ongoing efforts to support the most at-risk members of the population.





SEKOLAH KANAK-KANAK KHAS SETAPAK



Sekolah Kanak-Kanak Khas Setapak is dedicated to supporting children with vision impairment by providing specialised education tailored to their unique needs. Through the use of Braille, assistive technologies, and adaptive tools, students are able to access core subjects such as mathematics, science, and language arts in an inclusive and empowering environment.

Beyond academics, the school offers a range of extracurricular activities including sports, music, and the arts designed to build confidence, enhance social skills, and foster a strong sense of belonging among students with shared experiences. We are proud to support institutions like Sekolah Kanak-Kanak Khas Setapak in their mission to help every child find their place in the world and realise their full potential.

RAUDHATUS SAKINAH



Established in April 1998, Raudhatu Sakinah is a youth shelter and rehabilitation centre dedicated to supporting vulnerable young women and girls particularly those facing social challenges or unplanned pregnancies. The centre provides a safe space, daily necessities, and access to formal education, while also offering structured Islamic programs to nurture spiritual growth and moral development.

These young women are not only given a second chance at life, but are also equipped with practical skills such as sewing, cooking, handicrafts, and recreational activities. Through a holistic approach that integrates emotional, vocational, and spiritual support, Raudhatu Sakinah empowers its residents to heal, rebuild their lives, and move forward with renewed hope and dignity.



AU2 KEBUN KOMUNITI TAMAN KERAMAT

Urban poverty remains one of the most pressing and complex challenges in rapidly developing areas. The invisible nature of poverty in urban areas often hidden behind busy streets and tall buildings can make it difficult to address effectively. Whether through food aid, skills training, education support, or safe spaces for youth, these initiatives offer both immediate relief and long-term empowerment.

AU2 Kebun Komuniti Taman Keramat is one of the community gardens established under the Majlis Perbandaran Ampang Jaya (MPAJ). Initiated by members of Kawasan Rukun Tetangga (KRT) AU2 Keramat, the garden began with the cultivation of commonly used vegetables and herbs to serve the local community.

These crops along with small-scale livestock serve a dual purpose, it provides fresh produce for low-income families and generate income through local sales. In line with this spirit of community support, ARBA Foundation has actively assisted low-income families in the area by providing essential food items and financial aid during the holy month Ramadan. Beyond seasonal aid, a close relationship with the local head village (*ketua kampung*) is continuously maintained to ensure ongoing support for families or children in urgent need.





From Labuan to Kuala Lumpur : Expanding Horizons for Young Storytellers

A group of talented students from the Media Club of SMK Ranche-Ranche, Labuan were given the opportunity to travel to Kuala Lumpur to attend Malaysia's largest book fair, Pesta Buku Antarabangsa Kuala Lumpur not as spectators, but as young media practitioners. It was their first time flying and their first time in the capital. They documented events, conducted interviews, and stepping into roles they had only previously imagined within their school.

One moment became a defining milestone for the group: one of the students was given the rare opportunity to interview the Prime Minister of Malaysia, Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim. For a student from a small island school, standing before the nation's leader, asking questions and being heard, was a powerful affirmation of voice, confidence, and belonging. It transformed how the students saw themselves. They are no longer limited by geography or background, but capable of participating meaningfully on a national stage.

Beyond the book fair, the students experienced Kuala Lumpur through a city tour and a visit to Petrosains, many encountering hands-on science and innovation for the first time. These experiences expanded their sense of what learning could be and what their futures might hold. More than a trip, this programme became an intervention in exposure, shifting mindsets, building confidence, and planting belief that talent, when met with opportunity, can change a life's trajectory.

2 Contributing to National Policy: Toward a Poverty-Free Malaysia

The Framework Proposal for the National Poverty Policy was developed by the Ungku Aziz Center in collaboration with the Ministry of Economy, with the overarching goal of establishing a comprehensive and effective strategy to eradicate poverty in Malaysia. ARBA Foundation was honoured to participate in this pivotal initiative, alongside various government agencies and civil society organisations. Our team actively contributed insights from the ground, drawing from real-life experiences and challenges faced by low-income communities.

The diversity of perspectives enriched the review process, allowing for critical evaluation and thoughtful refinement of the proposed framework. The collaborative discussions culminated in a proposal that will be presented to the Ministry of Economy, marking a significant milestone in shaping Malaysia's future policy direction for poverty alleviation.



3 The 2024 National Poverty Symposium

The 2024 National Symposium: Eradicating Poverty marked a critical step forward in Malaysia’s commitment to eliminating poverty while promoting inclusive and equitable growth. As the nation moves closer to achieving high- income status, the focus has shifted to ensuring that economic prosperity reaches all segments of society, especially the B40 and the lower half of the M40 group, collectively known as the B60. This national-level discourse brought together diverse stakeholders from government agencies, the commercial sector, and civil society organisations to develop a coordinated strategy for implementing more effective poverty eradication programs across the country.

ARBA Foundation was honoured to participate as a panellist, representing the third sector in a session titled “New Approaches to Address Existing Poverty Challenges.” Drawing on our on-the-ground experience, we contributed insights on innovative, community-based strategies that address the root causes of poverty. While the road ahead is challenging, the symposium underscored a shared belief that poverty is not inevitable and progress, though sometimes slow, is always worth pursuing. As we move forward, we remain committed to tackling poverty with renewed determination, innovation, and a deep belief in the potential of every individual and community.

OUR PROGRAMS

Children born into disadvantaged environments are significantly more likely to face poorer health outcomes, reduced earning potential, shorter life expectancy, and lower levels of overall wellbeing compared to their peers.

At ARBA Foundation, every program we design is rooted in evidence, both from research and the lived experiences of the communities we serve. We are committed to continuously evolving our approach, refining each step to better respond to the complex challenges and opportunities faced by children and families in poverty.

Through this adaptive, evidence-based model, we strive to break the cycle of disadvantage and pave the way for a healthier, more hopeful future for the next generation.

SHORT TERM

Our one-off financial assistance programs are designed to provide immediate, short-term relief to individuals and families facing urgent and unforeseen hardships.


Whether due to medical emergencies, sudden loss of income, or other critical circumstances, these interventions offer timely support to help beneficiaries navigate moments of crisis with dignity.

LONG TERM

This customised, long-term program is designed and implemented using a whole family approach, addressing multiple dimensions of poverty within the household.

Impact is measured through consistent data collection, indepth analysis, and monthly progress evaluations ensuring accountability, adaptability, and tangible outcomes over time.

Long Term



Nadi

This program is a long-term, unconditional cash aid that empowers families to take charge of their lives. Each family receives a customised progress book to track spending, nutrition, and emotional well-being. This book acts as supporting self-reflection and helping our team monitor impact. By trusting families to meet their own needs, the program promotes resilience, autonomy, and lasting change.

Short Term



Adiwira

This program focuses on nurturing the talents and learning capacities of children from underserved backgrounds. By providing access to educational resources and skill-building opportunities, the initiative aims to level the playing field and empower children to reach their full potential. This program empowers every child to grow, excel, and pursue their dreams with confidence.

Teroka

This program inspires children to dream bigger through educational trips that expose them to new environments and experiences. These journeys spark curiosity, boost confidence, and broaden their view of what's possible, igniting imagination and ambition beyond their everyday lives.

Bantuan Kecemasan (Rapid Relief Aid)

This aid provides swift, targeted assistance to individuals and families affected by emergencies such as natural disasters, sudden job loss, hospitalisation, conflicts, and other unforeseen crises. Designed for urgent response, this aid aims to stabilise affected lives quickly, offering vital support when it is needed most.

Projek Susu Ibu

This program supports breastfeeding among low-income mothers by providing guidance, education, and essential resources. It helps them overcome challenges, ensuring healthier starts for both mother and child, while building supportive networks within vulnerable communities.

Bantuan Infaq Ramadan (Ramadhan Donation)

Bantuan Infaq Ramadan is a seasonal initiative that provides food, financial aid, and community support to underprivileged families during Ramadan. It aims to ease burdens, uphold the spirit of generosity, and restore dignity during this sacred month.



Smashing Barriers: Daniel and Danish's Journey to National Badminton Glory

We were introduced to Daniel and Danish's family through the Lembaga Zakat Selangor committee, with the goal of supporting these two rising talents in pursuing their passion for badminton under Projek Adiwira by ARBA Foundation.

The family faces significant financial hardship, struggling to meet even their basic daily needs, let alone afford training support for the boys. With the father battling a serious heart condition, the family of eight relies solely on the mother's monthly income of RM1,500.

Through the long-term support provided including basic necessities and structured training programs. Both of these exceptional junior athletes have made remarkable progress. Their dedication and talent have earned them selection into the prestigious Roslin Hashim Badminton Academy, a milestone that marks the beginning of a promising future.

From Silence to Speech : A Journey of Hope and Progress

Asyraf is a six-year-old boy and the youngest of three siblings. When we first met him, Asyraf was non verbal, relying entirely on sign language to communicate. His speech development was significantly delayed compared to typical milestones for children his age.

With the aid provided to support the family’s basic needs, Asyraf’s parents were able to redirect their limited income toward commuting costs and speech therapy treatment through a local health department. Thanks to consistent intervention, Asyraf has made meaningful progress transitioning from babbling to using single words and short phrases. He has also been issued an OKU card, which officially recognises his needs and opens the door to greater support services.

Today, Asyraf is enrolled in preschool and receiving early childhood education, with ongoing assistance to cover his monthly fees. His journey reflects the transformative power of timely support and the promise that every child, with the right help, can thrive.



Empowering Young Scouts with Visual Disabilities on a Global Stage

Eight scout members from SMK Pendidikan Khas Setapak, a school for visually impaired students, were proudly sponsored to attend the prestigious **NIPPON AGONOORE 2024 Camp** in Fukushima, Japan, from 8–12 August 2024. Held once every four years, the camp brings together scouts with special needs from around the world for inclusive, hands-on activities like origami, leather crafting, and cultural exchanges.

The Malaysian team performed a traditional silat showcase, witnessed by Princess Kako of Akishino, adding to the international spirit of the event. More than just a trip, this experience nurtured confidence, creativity, teamwork, and national pride that empowers these youths to shine on a global stage.

“For us, when we saw the data, we felt genuinely excited and wanted to explore further, especially because ARBA Foundation has direct contact with the community and truly understands what’s happening on the ground. That’s something we don’t usually have access to.

We often rely on literature and secondary sources, so hearing your real, hands-on experience is incredibly valuable. It would also be interesting to see how the situation in Malaysia compares to other countries. Another important issue is that many people are not captured in the formal system. NGOs like ARBA, who are close to the community, are in the best position to alert the government and say, ‘Hey, these people are not in your programs.’

Whether it’s newly impoverished individuals or vulnerable groups left out, NGOs know who’s falling through the cracks—and that insight is crucial.”


